Bringing Awareness to Breast Cancer Fighters and Survivors

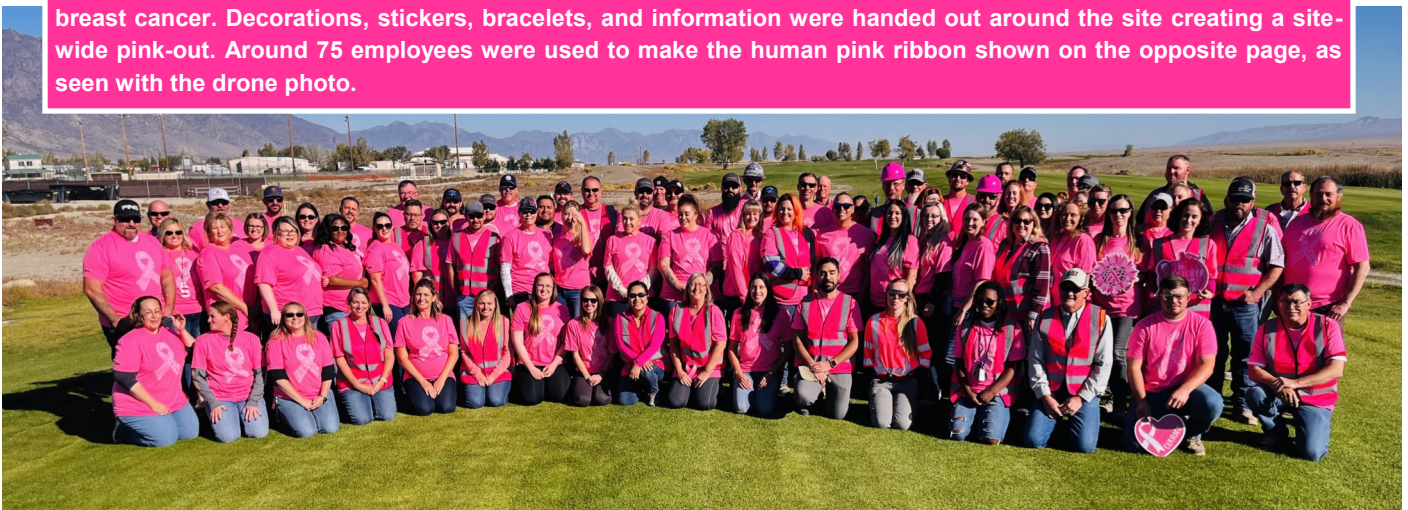

Spreading Awareness for Breast Cancer



Many of us have come to recognize October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The campaign to bring awareness to early screening and support has been around for four decades. It is a time annually devoted to educating everyone about breast cancer and the importance of early detection and access to quality care. Kinross COO Claude Schimper challenged the company's sites to step-up and involve employees in spreading awareness of breast cancer. Decorations, stickers, bracelets, and information were handed out around the site creating a site-wide pink-out. Safely Managing Cyanide

At Round Mountain, the use and management of cyanide requires stringent control at all times, from transportation to disposal. The site maintains the highest standards of cyanide management and has been certified as being fully compliant under the International Cyanide Management Code since 2008. Compliance requires on-site verification by an independent third-party auditor for initial certification and recertification every three years thereafter.

Transport, Storage and Use of Cyanide

Liquid sodium cyanide is transported to Round Mountain via tanker trucks, as the site is in close proximity to a distributor based in Winnemucca. Each truck is equipped with a GPS to track its journey and each truck driver is specially trained in accident prevention and emergency spill response.

At Round Mountain, a weak cyanide solution is used in the leaching and stripping process, where cyanide is safely added to crushed ore in a closed loop system. Cyanide bonds with gold and other metals from the rest of the material as part of the gold extraction process. The majority of the cyanide is broken down during the leaching process while the cyanide that is used in the mill is destroyed in the cyanide destruction tanks.

All employees who manage cyanide are rigorously trained in its safe handling, as well as in accident prevention and emergency response. Cyanide is also stored safely at site, and often used quickly to lessen risk and avoid long storage.

Safety

Kinross Round Mountain protects workers and visitors in the ore processing and mill areas from overexposure to cyanide.

Employees undertake a thorough and de-tailed training program in the use and handling of cyanide. They are able to recognize the signs of overexposure and are taught how to use cyanide antidote kits in the unlikely event of an accidental overexposure. Employees have also been trained in emergency procedures if a cyanide spill occurs.

Kinross Round Mountain performs risk assessments in cyanide use, and designs facilities with safeguards in place to prevent the likelihood of overexposure to employees or an accidental release to the environment. A comprehensive monitoring system and emergency response plans are in place.

Kinross Round Mountain's primary duty is to protect human safety, followed by pre-venting or reducing effects to the environment.

Environmental Protection

Protection of the environment is a high priority for Round Mountain. To ensure cyanide does not release or leak into the environment, multiple designs have been implemented, including: heavy duty liners, primary and secondary containment areas, tanks encased in concrete containments.

Round Mountain is a zero-discharge facility, which means that all process solution remains in containment and is never discharged to the environment, from operation to closure.

Ruthie Maxwell Wins State Golf Championship



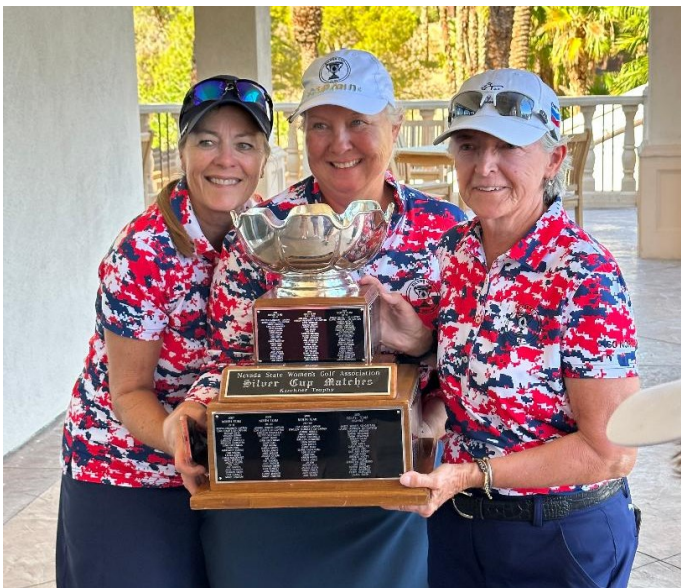
